WHAT IDAA CAN DO FOR YOU

IDAA strongly supports a 12 step recovery as the basis for everyone's program. We are not unique! However, specific issues do arise for healthcare professionals that are hard to deal with in regular 12 step meetings. Many health care providers struggling with drug issues feel uncomfortable in regular 12 step meeting, and others find differences in education and status hard to overcome.

Issues such as fear of failure, shame malpractice questions, lack of money, and licensure problems often discourage those who are new in recovery. Some recovering health care providers are in monitored professional groups, a setting which inhibits discussion of issues such as relapse and licensure and, as such, impairs honesty, which is crucial to long term recovery. In IDAA one is free to discuss such issues openly and receive support from many who have walked the same path in their professions.

Attending the IDAA annual meeting and sharing with other recovering health care providers helps greatly in getting past professional shame and remorse. Hearing positive experiences from colleagues with even worse problems fosters a willingness to pursue recovery. It may even help restore one's professional reputation. A significant benefit is helping family members understand the disease of addiction and promoting family recovery as well, with the goal of breaking the recurring family cycle of addiction.
